A Day in the Life of Bu3a Games Galore Group

2 pm approaches, and members are in the final stages of deciding, on the basis of today's turnout (usually 20-30), who will sit where, and play what. The room is already set up by a loyal team of helpers, so no time is wasted. For some keen, chatty, early folk, the world has already been put to rights, several times, but it is time to get serious (but not too serious, I add). The hall at Birdwell is a spot-on venue for our two-hour session, as the tables allow for flexible playing group sizes, varying from 2 (chess, occasional cribbage), through 3 and 4 (mah jong, canasta, Rummikub) to 8 (Mexican Train, a popular dominos game), with good space between games (some can get a tad rowdy, others maintain a monastic silence).

A wide range of other games is available, either stored in our bu3a filing cabinet, or, by request, from the co-ordinator's own collection. We do not venture into the territory of the now wide range of newer games (Pandemic; Carcasson, etc) and time does not really suit the needs of Monopoly. Come 3pm, or thereabouts as fits their particular game, players get up and makes themselves a drink (with high-class biscuit), paid for via a small 'group kitty' that also funds any new game that might be needed. Instructions are available for all games played, and members are willing, where possible, to guide 'newbies' as they learn the rules.

From humble beginnings (chess for 3-6 people), the Group is now about 20 years old. It is unusual (but not unique) in bu3a, in that a wide range of game options is available. It also lends itself to the accommodation of other small friendship groups within bu3a that would simply like a place where they could come, as a group, and do their own thing.

At the 2024 Summer School, Barnsley u3a was brilliantly represented by Margaret Alton, Christine Palmer and Beth Rudkin.



Margaret Alton: Scottish Colourists and their Art

I decided to offer this course as I am passionate about the Scottish Colourists. Eleven delegates spent a busy few days learning about the lives and works of four artists -

Francis Campbell Boileau Cadell, John Duncan Fergusson, George Leslie Hunter and Samuel John Peploe. Each delegate then chose one artist and one particular painting from the point of view of technique (colour, composition, medium), context, meaning and effects (how do you feel when you look at this painting ?) and prepared a presentation to show to the rest of the group.

I had originally 6 delegates signed up for the course but one lady thought it meant Media Studies such as television and radio etc. So she changed courses.

The first day didn't go too well as I had prepared a sample piece for everyone to do just as a trial to show what mixed media was and give them a chance to try and create their own picture. I had given them a small canvas marked up with the outlines of the picture together with a copy of the actual picture. It was met with "we don't want to do this" and the only male student said he preferred doing watercolour pictures. Not a very good start!! I was stumped what to do next so said they could do something else if they had brought some ideas with them.

Luckily the next day was so much better. Everyone settled down and started chatting and embraced the concept of mixed media. Even the watercolour man said he would give it a go. What a lovely, talented group they turned out to be and produced some amazing artwork. I think everyone enjoyed it and realised what could be achieved just by cutting and sticking random pieces of paper and different material on a sheet of paper or canvass. Success all round!

The Bu3a AGM was held on 3rd June at Priory Centre. After the AGM business was concluded we were entertained by the Bu3a Ceilidh Band. As can be seen , many different instruments contribute to the wonderful sound.

At the July meeting, Adrian and Janet from Wentworth Castle Estate gave an excellent presentation on the introduction of electric lighting in all areas of the Castle and its surrounding buildings in 1885. It is believed to be the first commercial installation and was not updated until 1948 when the estate was sold to Barnsley Corporation as a Teacher Training College. The original system was installed by Wilson Hartnell at a cost of £3049 (approx.. £500k in todays money) – “Far less expensive than candles”

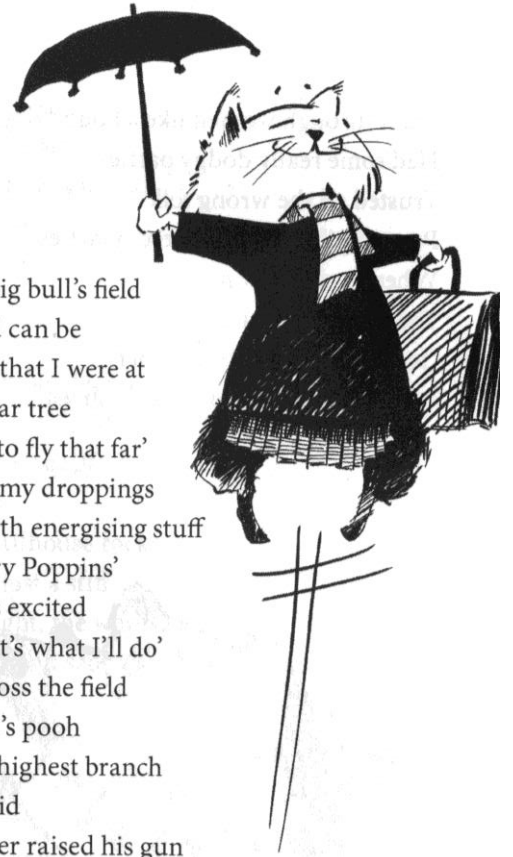

November 5 The Wind Knows My Name by Isobel Allende.

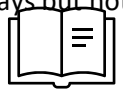
This is a very moving saga of escape with new beginnings, sacrifice and danger.

AUTUMN RECIPE – TUNA AND BROCCOLI BAKE

Ingredients:

- 1 red pepper thinly sliced
- 1 can condensed mushroom soup
- 100 ml milk
- 2 x 200 g tuna drained
- 50 g grated cheese
- 2 tbsp. breadcrumbs
- 1 tbsp. oil
- 3 to 4 pieces broccoli broken into small florets
- 225 g pasta

Preheat oven to 200o c/Fan 180o C/ Gas 6.
Plunge broccoli into a pan of boiling water for 3 minutes, cool under cold running water and drain. Cook pasta, stir fry pepper in oil until soft, pour in soup and milk, stir well and heat through. Place all ingredients in large ovenproof dish, sprinkle with breadcrumbs and cheese and cook for 20 minutes until golden brown.

The Summer Concert was held in Wombwell Methodist Church on 23 July.

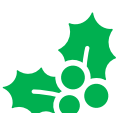
